


Stormwater Precautions

The Stormwater Commission would like to remind you to please remember to take the following precautions and obey city ordinances whenever there are heavy rains in the city.

- 1. Stop basement sewer backups by installing a drain plug. They are available at any hardware store.
- When you cut your grass please do not let the mower throw the clippings into the street. It is not only unsightly, but will plug up the street drains. The same applies to raking leaves.
- 3. Protect your vehicle and respect everyone's property by not driving through high water on streets. Cars will drown out and waves made by vehicles will erode yards and push water into basements through windows. If you own a vehicle that sits high (4x4, etc.) please drive very slowly through flooded streets.
- 4. Since the city crews have many, many drains to clean, you can help prevent street flooding by cleaning debris from nearby street drains usually at the corners of intersections. Your neighbors will thank you.
- 5. Wherever you see barricades, please do not drive through or around them. They are there for a specific reason. For more information or to answer questions, call the Public Service Department at 251-3122.

The annual fall cleanup is scheduled for the week of October 5, 1992. To assure pickup, all items must be placed at the front curb by 8 A.M. on the scheduled day. AFTER THE TRUCK HAS BEEN IN YOUR AREA, IT WILL NOT RETURN. If we fall behind schedule we will continue where we left off the following day.

** NEW REGULATIONS **

Effective July 1, 1992, the State of Illinois has banned "white goods" from landfills. This means that the following items *WILL NOT* be picked up:

stoves refrigerators washers dryers freezers dishwashers furnaces
hot water heaters
air conditioners
humidifiers
de-humidifiers
trash compactors

Other items that will not be picked up are:

- tires, automobile batteries, wheels, and large parts
- brush and landscape waste (leaves, grass, etc.)
- gasoline, motor oil, anti-freeze, etc.
- liquid waste (paint, thinner, etc.)
- hazardous waste
- unopened barrels
- concrete blocks
- large amounts of building materials

Lumber will be accepted if it is cut into 4 foot lengths and tied in bundles weighing less than 75 pounds.

Leaf Pickup

The City will begin curbside leaf pickup on Monday, November 2 and will continue until the end of the month. Leaves should be raked to the curb or street edge early in the morning on the scheduled pick up day. (See schedule below.) Leaves should not be allowed to remain in the gutter line in case of rain as the leaves will plug the catch basins and cause flooding during a rain. The City will make every attempt to follow the schedule, although weather conditions and heavy amounts of leaves may cause delays. Your patience in these circumstances is appreciated.

Other alternatives for leaf disposal:

Burning - Burning is permissible on your own property from mid-September to mid-May, during daylight hours only. Leaf burning must be supervised, with a garden hose close at hand. Burning in streets and alleys is prohibited.

Bagging - Leaves may be bagged and taken to the City Recycling Center at 14th Street where they may be dumped into a dumpster. (Plastic bags are not allowed in the dumpster.) There is no charge to dump at the Recycling center which is open Fri, Sat, and Mon from 8 am to 4 pm, and on Sun from noon to 4 pm.

Composting - mix leaves with grass clippings and let them decay; this makes a nice topsoil.

RECYCLE YOUR OLD PHONE BOOKS - A special dumpster will be provided by Illinois Bell for recycling of TELEPHONE BOOKS ONLY from October 12 to November 12. You may bring your old phone books to the City Garage during this time period only for recycling.

Hydrant Flushing

The City of Wood River will be flushing fire hydrants again this fall, during the week of November 2 through 6. Residents may experience some discoloration in their water, but the water will continue to be safe to drink. Despite the inconvenience of the discolored water, it is necessary to flush fire hydrants to remove any sediment that might have settled in the water mains and also to insure that the fire hydrants remain in good working order. * * *1992 Triathlon * * *

The 7th Annual Wood River Triathlon, sponsored by Amoco, Coca-Cola and Shell Oil was held in Central Park on Saturday, August 8, 1992. Starting at 7am, the participants were required to swim 450 meters, bike 12 miles and run 4 miles.

Five of the 115 participants were from Wood River. The remaining triathletes were nonresidents from areas as close as East Alton and as far away as Indiana. Two new age divisions were added this year, 11-15, and 60 and above. The overall female winner was Judy Johnson-Durr (1 hour, 9 minutes and 21 seconds) of Alton and the overall male winner was Doug Pohlman (1 hour, 3 minutes and 6 seconds) of East Alton.

Approximately 150 volunteers from the areas of Wood River, Roxana, East Alton, Edwardsville, and St. Louis helped with the triathlon. Many of these volunteers were members of the following

organizations: City of Wood River - City Manager, Finance, Fire, Police, Street and Parks Recreation Departments (including Advisory Board) Mid-American Bicycle Club, Metro-Tri Club, T.O.P.S., Boy Scouts and the East Alton-Wood River High School Oilerettes, Cheerleaders and Football Team. The expertise and knowledge these individuals offered was crucial to the success of this event.

After the race all of the volunteers, participants and their families were invited to a free lunch and an afternoon of swimming and sliding at the Aquatic Center. Also contributing to the breakfast and lunch were Brown's Chicken, Bunny Bread, McDonald's (East Alton and Bethalto), Snack Time and Subway.

Belk Park News

After a number of years of wishing and a year of committee deliberations, construction will start on a new clubhouse in Belk Park. While the City Council was in agreement on the need for a new Clubhouse, the Council was divided on whether the new clubhouse should be located on the site of the present clubhouse or relocated to adjacent land which the city has recently purchased. A final decision was made in September to stay at the present location.

The new clubhouse, designed by Chiodini & Associates, will be an attractive addition to Belk Park. Two wings form an "L" off a central community room. The front "L" will contain men and women locker rooms, storage and mechanical. The wing to the left will house the proshop and snack bar. The community room will have capacity for 150 persons, adequate for the many tournaments held at the course. The community room will be available for rent to Wood River residents for private functions when not in use by golfers. Thanks to the 15 Clubhouse Committee members for their time on this project.

Also, construction will be starting on a new irrigation system for the course. The present system, which has served the course for 20 years, is labor intensive and does not meet the needs of a modern course. Sprinkling capability will be substantially increased. The entire course can be watered in one 8-hour night-time period. This has been one of the problems with the present system. Watering the greens now takes so long that once all 18

greens were sprinkled in a one or two day period, the first greens watered need rewatering with the tees and fairways left dry.

These projects, along with tee reconstruction and landscaping, will be done by May of 1993. Another banner year for Belk Park is in progress.

Irrigation Well Rehab

A golf course cannot grow grass without water and Belk Park is fortunate to have a good supply. The lakes on the course do collect rain water, but that is not nearly enough to satisfy the irrigation needs.

Water for golf course irrigation comes from wells located on the City garage site at 14th and Madison. This was the former site of the City Water Department prior to the new water treatment system built on the west side of Highway 143 overpass in 1965. One of the old wells at the garage site pumps water in a separate dedicated line up to Belk Park. Again, the City was fortunate in being able to use an abandoned petroleum line as the line for water to be pumped up to the park. The well water is totally untreated and is considered non-potable, but it is more than adequate for the irrigation and for the fish in Belk Park Lake.

This summer the pumping capacity of our well decreased to the point where repairs had to be made. The City contracted with Layne-Western to replace the 30-year-old pump and motor. This new equipment has increased our pumping capacity from approximately 300 gallons per minute to nearly 1,000 gallons per minute. This is the first major expenditure that the golf course has had to make on the pump system since it was taken over from the Water Department.

1992 Message From the City Manager

We are proud of the recent *Telegraph* headline which read "Wood River's financial status draws plaudits". The first sentence read "Auditors have given the city a clean bill of health, although sales and income taxes have fallen." We want to highlight that the Wood River City Council and City Administration is fiscally responsible. By Illinois State law, we must have a balanced budget. We cannot have a deficit budget. If prices go up to the City, we have to have service cutbacks or growth in our revenues in order to balance

our budget. This is the way a City has to operate.

We are now full swing in an election year campaign. We hear it from all of the National candidates: "Services are going to be increased. The tax line is going to be maintained or reduced!" This has meant a reduction in assistance to the cities from the State and Federal government or it has meant additional work for the cities with no funds from the Federal government. A prime example is that residents can no longer put old appliances out for trash pick-up. Federal regulations have mandated that landfills can not take these

old appliances. That puts a burden on local government and the local residents with no relief for this change being made. We can expect additional mandates on our water system and sewer system. All of these will cost us some money and we will be sure there will be no help from the State or Federal government to implement them.

I think we can continue to be proud of the way that Wood River has managed its financial affairs. Citizens know they can speak up and be heard. The message needs to be heard at other levels of government too.



Sarah has always been active in the community. She served as a member of the City's Plan Commission and Board of




Zoning Appeals for over 20 years and volunteers her time to the annual Triathlon.

The City congratulates Sarah on her 30 years and hopes she'll continue as a swimming instructor for many more years.







Council Corner

Malls are closing, Downtown shopping districts in small towns across the country have fallen into disrepair, and retailers are closing their doors in unprecedented numbers.

Amid this fairly bleak national picture a point of light is beginning to shine through, right here in Wood River. We are fighting the trends. Although not yet fully visible to the public eye, a rejuvenation is taking place in our downtown area. A tiny flame that is feverishly burning at this very moment is expected to burst into a bright flame during 1993.

The combined efforts of the Wood River business community, City Officials, Local Investors, and Loyal Customers are giving our downtown that shot in the arm that a few years ago we all thought improbable if not impossible. Let me take a moment to discuss just a few of the important elements that are causing this change to occur

- 1. The new bridge and the new highway systems which are nearing completion will place Wood River, and especially downtown, smack in the middle as the hub of the metro east traffic system. The daily traffic count through the downtown area is expected to zoom to over 30,000 cars per day.
- 2. The Tax Increment Financing District which was wisely established by the City Council in 1987 to take advantage of some economic development legislation is now generating enough revenue to replace and repair streets, sidewalks and water problems. By law these funds must be spent in the T.I.F. district.
- 3. Storefronts and offices in downtown are filling up. In the past several years we have had over 90% occupancy.
- 4. Owners are opening businesses in their own buildings at a quickening pace. Owners who occupy their own buildings tend to take more pride in their property and care more for the appearance. This also seems to be a sign that good investment opportunities exist downtown.
 - 5. The City Council and city

- administrators have been taking an unusually serious interest in developing downtown. There seems to be a determined commitment by this City Council to make the downtown comeback a reality.
- 6. Financial packages and incentives have been developed to encourage the renovation of buildings to make them safer, more functional, and to spruce up their appearance. Many merchants are actively fixing up their buildings.
- 7. Approximately fifteen years ago the property owners downtown formed the Wood River Development Corp. This group levied a special tax upon themselves to use downtown. Recently this group has become quite active in their quest to improve downtown. Several eyesores have already been removed. During 1993 this group will begin actively purchasing and renovating quality structures to rent or resell.
- 8. Self promotion is the factor that is most critical in the success of downtown. If you build it, they won't necessarily come! If you promote it well, they can't resist! Civic Action, our promotion group downtown, is on the move. This group is composed of merchants in the downtown area brought together for the sole purpose of creating sales and excitement in downtown Wood River. With the influx of new owner-occupied buildings came the added ingredient of new blood to this organization giving it the vitality and creativity not seen for a long time. Our

highly successful Sidewalk Sale & Festival, which brought nearly 15,000 shoppers to downtown is a sample of things to come from this group.

Yes, I believe that we do have our own point of light right here in Wood River. By this time next year downtown will have changed dramatically.

- * New streets and sidewalks will be in place.
- * New street lights will have been installed by Illinois Power.
- * Many more businesses will have redone their storefronts.
- Several buildings will be entirely renovated, with others under construction.
- * Advertising and activities downtown will be intensified.
- * Our Sidewalk Sale & Festival will be much larger and other exciting events will be added.

Downtowns are the very heart beat of every small community, and Wood River is no exception. If our downtown business district is attractive and doing well, it makes us all feel a little better and proud of our town. We have a great team working very hard for that success, but there is a part to be played by each of you. In order to be successful we need each of you to promote not only downtown but all of Wood River as a good place to shop and raise our families.

Each of us can become an ambassador for Wood River!
