In conjunction with **Family Days**, the Aquatic Center will hold their traditional **tug-of-war** and swimmers can compete in various **games** for **prizes**.

# NEW DEPARTMENT TO PROMOTE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Department of Economic and Community Development was recently created within the City to carry out the community's role in economic development while continuing the staff's efforts in City Planning, maintenance of property values and elimination of health hazards, unsafe conditions and eyesores. The Director's role will be to seek businesses and developers, and emphasize the advantages offered for the entire City, the tax increment financing district, and

enterprise zone. A list of tasks this new department will be assigned includes the following: coordination of all development, initiating and supporting community and economic development programs and projects, enforcement of zoning and subdivision ordinances and land use regulations, issuing permits, conducting site and building inspections, and providing staff and technical support to the Plan Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals and City Manager.

It is the City's intend to constantly pursue ways to be effective and continue to grow in the field of economic development.


#### MARK MARCUZZO

His law enforcement career has enabled him to observe first hand the implementation of advanced record processing, radar, computers, complex recording and telephone systems, and sophisticated training equipment, to name a few. Ralph commented, "In the 23 years I've been a police officer, the citizens of Wood River have always shown a strong support for the Police Department. I hope that the next 23 years shows this same support, because they have one of the best police forces a community could have."

#### WATER PLANT OPERATOR II




Paul Kelley completes 20 years at City Water Plant.

Farms Deli at Ferguson and Whitelaw. Shortly thereafter his family moved to Harnett Street where he was raised.

Paul started work for the City in 1962 under City Manager Laird. His title was Building Inspector and he helped bring that department into the 20th century.

Paul and his wife, Mary, are camping enthusiasts and plan to spend his retirement traveling the country. The Kelley's will also spend winters in Florida, and when not traveling, do volunteer work in the area. Much time will also be spent with their five children and nine grandchildren.

Since the early days of Standard Oil, the manufacturing and transportation of chemicals through Wood River has been a fact of life. Tankers running down the designated truck routes and rail cars rolling along the west end tracks are all but ignored by those of us who grew up with these sights. In short, we know the chemicals are there, but until there is an accident, most of us don't care.

This is not the case with the local emergency services; fire, police, ambulance, and industrial responders. In August of 1986, several Fire Chiefs and representatives from industry met for lunch to discuss the possibilities of cross-training employees and developing an area-wide plan to handle accidents. What started out as a pizza luncheon, soon developed into the Twin Rivers CAER Council.

To clarify our title, Twin Rivers stands for the juncture of the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers, a focal point of the area. CAER stands for Community Awareness and Emergency Response, a logo of the Chemical Manufacturers Association who initiated the program. And last is the Council, made up of representatives from local municipalities and industries. this time, Twin Rivers CAER has voting members from Amoco Petroleum, Bethalto, Clark, East Alton, Hartford, Olin Corporation, Rosewood Heights, Roxana, Shell Oil, South Roxana, Wood River, and Wood River Township Hospital.

The goal of Twin Rivers CAER is to reach out to the public with information on chemicals that pass through their community; to establish a comprehensive emergency response plan; and to train emergency service personnel to execute that plan, should the need arise. To accomplish this goal is not an easy task, nor is it a task which sees an ending. New members, recognizing the need to prepare, continue to join us. The Emergency Operation Plan, adopted in October of 1987, continues to change as better methods of operation are found.

Semi-annual drills, used to test capabilities, are planned, executed, and critiqued. A never-ending cycle of training and retraining, both young and old employees, continues in every member department.

Just as our community grows, so does the need to prepare for the unexpected disaster, be it chemical or otherwise. Through its involvement with the Twin Rivers CAER Council, the City of Wood River is doing just that. So, the next time you see a tanker or rail car with a sign on the side that reads FLAMMABLE or DANGEROUS, remember that we are preparing because we CAER.

#### WOOD RIVER LAUDED FOR WATER QUALITY



In April of this year the Illinois Department of Public Health officially recognized and commended Wood River's water supply for the high degree of compliance in 1987 with the State Fluoridation Law. The valuable benefits of water fluoridation are provided only when the concentration of fluoride is consistently maintained.


The State currently issues special Certificates of Recognition to water suppliers that have achieved 100% compliance with the law. We narrowly missed achieving a 100% compliance record. The City proudly passes this information on to its residents.

### SPRING CLEANUP TIME



Spring cleanup will again be scheduled the first two weeks in June. As in the past, we will pick up items placed at the curb. There will be no alley pickups. Brush and limbs will not be picked up unless they are cut into 3-4 foot lengths and tied in bundles of reasonable size. Building materials such as bricks, concrete or blocks will not be accepted.

There's no better time than the present to begin getting your home, garage and yard in shape. Refer to the map above for the date the truck will be in your area. If for some reason we fall behind schedule, we will continue the next day.

from the General Inspectors.....

Since we seem to accumulate more trash and yard debris during the summer months, the General Inspectors have some reminders for us. Always place household garbage in tightly sealed trash containers.

Grass, leaves, paper and other debris should be placed in trash bags.

Limbs and branches will be picked up by the sanitation people if they are cut in 3-4 foot lengths and bundled.

The General Inspectors would like to call your attention to another yard violation occurring in various areas within the City. Parking vehicles in a required front yard or in a public right-of-way easement is a violation of City Code and can detract from the general appearance of the neighborhood.

It will also be beneficial to remember that these "tips" are being enforced for the benefit of the community as a whole. They not only improve the appearance of your home but your neighborhood and community will profit from your effort. Let's work together in developing a real sense of pride in Wood River.



Answers/Responses (from last issue)

Several letters were received concerning various aspects of relocated Highway 143 with suggestions as to what the City should do in these matters. Since this is a State highway, neither the City Council or City staff have the authority to effect changes concerning left turn signals, street signs, or specific landscaping choices.

Our City Engineer questioned the Illinois Department of Transportation regarding the need for left turn lanes and/or signals at certain intersections on relocated Highway 143 during the planning stage. The State studied those intersections and confirmed that the traffic count did not warrant left turn signals and, therefore, denied the request from our Traffic Commission and engineer.

Many times when a major crime occurs and is solved, we as residents only hear about the high profile items that can be sensationalized by the news media. usually don't hear about what is actually involved in the investigation.

During a recent major case a total of twelve officers from our police department compiled, between them, over 350 hours within a four-day period. Additionally, eleven other police officers from seven different police departments assisted in various stages of the investigation. assistant state's attorney remained at the scene to provide necessary legal assistance; two volunteer search and rescue organizations provided approximately fifteen men and women; two men from the public works department were assigned; a local river business provided a boat and two crew members at no charge; and the U.S. Coast Guard provided technical assistance.

Also one of our firefighters, who happened to be a neighbor, opened up his home to all of those involved in the His home served as a investigation. unique "command center" and seemed to have a never-ending pot of coffee.

It's very easy for us to take our police department, fire department and other public safety orgainzations for granted, at least until a significent event occurs. These are the times when we can reflect and realize the magnificant job that these men and women did, and do for us.

Whether paid or volunteers, they deserve our appreciation for their efforts, for their skills, and for their dedication. Please join me in thanking those dedicated individuals who provide our public safety. They are the ones that make us all proud to live in Wood River.
