# Preparing Your Water Lines For Winter

Winter is almost here! Everyone should check their water lines, inside and outside, for areas that might need protection from the cold weather. Heat tape and/or insulation may be necessary when water lines are exposed to freezing temperatures. Shut off and drain hose bibs and yard spigots. Replacement of broken or cracked glass and caulking around windows may also be wise, particularly when located near water lines.

If you have had problems with freezing pipes in the past, when the temperature drops below freezing let your water run in a small steady stream where it will easily drain, especially if you have plastic piping. Plastic pipe is very difficult to thaw out once frozen and you may be without water for a long time.

It would also be a good idea to take the time to locate the water shutoff valve in your home or business. If you should experience a water leak due to frozen and broken lines, you can shut off the water supply and prevent water loss and water damage.

### DISASTER INFORMATION

#### **Before Disaster Strikes**

Scientists have for years warned that the threat of an earthquake in the Central United States is eminent, only recent media attention has brought the reality home to many people. If one dismisses the urge to panic, any disaster preparedness, be it an earthquake, flood, tornado, or other catastrophe, is a step in the right direction to help your family survive.

### So What is the City Doing to Prepare?

The City staff is taking the opportunity to update Wood River's Disaster Plan. Studying a worst case disaster scenario, we have established a command structure, mapped out emergency routes, arranged for emergency fuel and water supplies, designated shelters, and listed all resources that may be needed. The location of some of the evacuation centers being considered are EAWR Community High School, Lewis & Clark School, Round House, VFW Post, St. Paul's Lutheran Church and St. Bernard's Gym. Others might be added as the facilities are made available. No city is totally prepared for every emergency, but we are working toward it. A well informed public will be our greatest resource.

### What Should I do to Prepare for a Disaster?

Home preparedness can go a long way in providing immediate relief. Over the past several weeks, news articles have presented the basic outline for home survival. These should be studied carefully and discussed among family members. Drills for various types of disasters should be a family affair. Pamphlets to assist in your planning are still available at City Hall, the Fire Department, the Library and the American Red Cross. Assume you will need essentials such as food, water,

sanitary, heat, medications, etc. to supply your family needs for up to one week. Plan to survey your home for damages and know how to disconnect all utilities if necessary. Place a sign on your front door stating ALL OKAY or NEED HELP. If you must evacuate to a shelter, plan to secure your home, leaving pets behind. Carry your driver's license or other type of identification at all times.

### What Might Citizens Expect After a Disaster?

We know a recognized pattern will follow. Initially, people are in shock. Everything we take for granted: telephones, gas, water, electricity, sewers, even homes may be lost. After loved ones are taken care of, people begin to volunteer to assist friends, relatives and emergency crews. Then this work and stress leads to fatigue and a sense of despair and loss. Finally, anger and frustration set in, usually misdirected at emergency agencies. People want to be

normal again, to them it seems relief efforts are going too slow and someone has to be blamed for their predicament. In truth, emergency services, though doing all they can, are probably overwhelmed and understaffed. The return to normalcy, depending on the disaster, may take days, weeks or even years. Other emergency measures may include: curfews to prevent looting, road blocks, rationing, emergency building permits, parks used for dumping debris. All this paints a very bleak picture of post disaster life in a community. Still the situation will be more bearable if you take some time to prepare now.

### What About Disaster Relief?

There are numerous agencies, federal, state and institutional, which supply disaster relief. However, not all aid can or should come from these organizations. Some personal expenses will not be covered.

### Helpful Hints in a Disaster

During a disaster or even a warning, PLEASE do not call the Fire or Police Department unless you need help. Tying up these lines prevents others from getting through and getting our assistance.

Keep all emergency numbers by your phone.

## For Any Emergency



Flashlights with spare batteries. Keep a flashlight beside your bed. Do not use matches or candles after an earthquake until you are certain no gas leaks exist.




Portable radio with spare batteries. Most telephones will be out of order or used for emergency purposes so radios will be your best source of information.



First Aid Kit; first aid knowledge have a first aid book such as the *Standard First Aid & Personal Safety* by the American National Red Cross. Have members of your household take basic Red Cross first aid and CPR courses.



Fire Extinguishers. Keep a fire extinguisher handy for small fires. Some extinguishers are only good for certain types of fires—electrical, grease, or gas. Class ABC extinguishers are designed to use safely on any type of fire.

Water — should be stored in air-tight containers and replaced about every six months. Store at least three gallons of water per person to be prepared for a 72-hour period. Also have purification tablets such as Halazone and Globaline but read the label on the bottle before using tablets.



**Special Items.** Have at least a week's supply of medications and special foods needed for infants or those on limited diets.



**Tools.** Pipe Wrench and Crescent Wrench — for turning off gas and water mains.



**Food.** It's always a practical idea to keep a supply of non-perishable food on hand which can be rotated into your diet and replenished on a regular basis.

Teach responsible members of your family how to turn off electricity, gas and water at main switch and valves. **Caution:** Do not shut off gas unless an emergency exists. If gas is ever turned off, remember that all pilot lights must be relit.


### Tax Levy

The proposed annual tax levy for the City of Wood River contains NO increase in the City's tax rate. For most of our residents, this means their respective real estate taxes paid to the City will remain at the same level as last year.

The following graphic is presented to demonstrate the breakdown of a typical property tax bill. (This piece of real estate is located within the Wood River-Hartford Elementary School District and the East Alton Wood River Community High School District).

As one can see, the City receives fifteen (15) percent of the typical property tax bill. The majority of property taxes goes to the local school districts with the remaining balance spread out among the other various governmental entities within our area.

In respect to revenue, the City's General Fund receives only eleven (11) percent of its overall revenue from property tax. The General Fund of the City includes the Police, Fire, Recreation, Street, and Administrative Departments of the City.



### Water/Sewer Rate Increases—a Necessity

Inflation affects the cost of City operations just as it does the individual homeowner. For the past several years the costs of chemicals, maintenance and labor have been rising annually.

In addition to the treatment of water and sewage, there are many more expenses connected with the operation of the Water and Sewer Plants, such as maintenance/repairs, replacement of mains/lines, labor equipment, debts, depreciation, etc.

While these costs have been skyrocketing, the City had not raised water rates since 1982 and sewer rates had not been increased since 1985. Therefore, the City has been dispursing water and sewage treatment to users at rates below the actual cost. This has resulted in a deficit balance in the Sewer Fund.

Following the City's audit for fiscal year 1989/90, a strong recommendation was given from our auditor that rates must be increased. In addition, EPA mandates that financial stability must be maintained in the Sewer Fund in accordance with our construction grant agreement. It is essential that enterprises be self-sustaining in order to avoid subsidies from the General Fund.

#### How You Can Help:

There are ways you can help reduce your bill, and also help to reduce costs for the City, which could ultimately affect your rate.

- lose. Check for faucets and toilets leaking. 90% of water leaks come from toilets and this can be costly to you. One drop of water per second from a leaky faucet can add up to as much as 4 gallons per day. Toilets constantly running can use 100,000 gallons of water in 12 months.
- 2. Conserve on water by reducing shower time, reduce water level in toilet, etc.
- 3. Any article flushed down the stool; (such as emptied ashtrays, kleenex and other solids) enters the treatment plant and is treated as a solid.

  Treatment of solids is costly to the city and increases the total costs of operation.

#### Other Alternatives:

The City Council has had a total of five long work sessions looking at every type of alternative possible to reduce costs in the Water and Sewer Fund to keep the rate increase as minimal and fair as possible. The following adjustments have been made:

- 1. Water Plant has reduced their operation to two shifts which allowed the elimination of one water plant operator. This was done to lower operating costs.
- 2. All city facilities have been metered so that the City is paying for their usage the same as anyone else.

- Maintain a strict shut-off policy.
   Prompt paying customers should not subsidize late payments.
- 4. Tap-on fees have been increased so that the new customer is paying the actual cost for tapping to the City's line.
- A thorough check has been conducted for unaccounted water to insure that water is billed for water pumped. This was reduced from 13% to 4%.

The City officials will make every effort to continue to explore additional ways to cut expenses. However, we must meet the standards set by the IEPA in the treatment of water and sewage to comply with State Law.

#### **New Rates:**

Water Rates have been increased from \$1.30 per 1,000 gallons to \$1.60 per 1,000 gallons. A family of 3 using 6,000 gallons per month, would pay an additional \$1.80 per month.

Sewer Rates have been increased from \$1.10 per 1,000 gallons to \$1.50 per 1,000 gallons. A family of 3 using 6,000 gallons per month would pay an additional \$1.90 per month. However the bi-monthly billing charge has been reduced from \$3.25 to \$2.85. Also, for those using over 13,000 gallons of water during the summer months, the sewer fees will be waived.


#### How Do We Compare with Other Cities:

### Council Corner

It will finally become a reality! New water lines in Lincoln Addition!

A Community Development Block Grant has been signed, sealed and delivered to the Community Development Office in Edwardsville. This grant will provide the funds for the replacement of water lines in Lincoln Addition area. The inferior 2" water lines will be replaced with 4" lines which branch off from an existing 6" main. Also a storm water system will be constructed to replace an existing open ditch along the length of George Street to the 6th Street Basin. Upon completion of the water lines and storm water improvements, George Street will be curbed, guttered and a new asphalt surface will be applied.

When: Bids will be received as soon as the City has the "notice to proceed" from Community Development.

This is a long-awaited project and we are anxiously awaiting final approval so construction can start next Spring.

More Good News: Sanitary sewers are under construction in the Vaughn Hills Subdivision. This project too has been on the City's priority list for many years and has finally become a reality.

An 8" water main will be constructed on the West side of Old St. Louis Road from Harnett to Conley. This improvement will provide extra fire protection and also serve for new industrial and commercial development in the City's Enterprise Zone.

Additional community projects are being planned for the future.
