WHAT IS IT?




Wood River Stormwater Commission members Carroll Carr, Robert Dixon, the late Frank Cornell, Dave Murray, Steve Skundrich, John Garner, and Emery Dial have found a temporary solution to a menacing problem of flooded streets during a heavy rain. A nuisance persists when runoff from heavy rain in a short period of time, temporarily fills the streets, which in turn, causes traffic problems.

Basically, barricades (see center of photo above) will be stretched across the street to prevent traffic from causing erosions, splashing stormwater onto lawns, and making wakes that may cause stormwater to enter houses or basements.

If you live in an area that is blocked off and you need to return to your home, please drive with caution using the alleyways if possible. The areas to be protected by barricading are from Esther to Tennyson and 13th Street to 9th Street. If you would like more information, please call the Public Works Department at:

Spring means the beginning of tornado season in the Midwest. Severe thunderstorms and tornadoes rolling up from Oklahoma, across Missouri, into Illinois, an area often called "Tornado Alley", are a fact of life. There is little we can do about the weather, but we can be prepared.

First, lets look at the National Weather Service's advanced warning system, our first line of caution. When conditions exist, you may hear a broadcast on television or radio. An alert will be sent out in one of four categories:

- 1) <u>Severe Thunderstorm Watch</u> means thunderstorms are likely and tornadoes may develop. Listen closely for further information.
- 2) <u>Severe Thunderstorm Warning</u> means severe thunderstorms are occurring. Listen carefully for further warning or take shelter.
- 3) <u>Tornado Watch</u> means thunderstorms and tornadoes are likely. Keep listening and be prepared to take shelter.
- 4) Tornado Warning means a tornado has been detected either by sight or radar. If it is in our immediate area, the sirens will sound and you should take shelter immediately. An "All Clear" will be sounded when the danger has passed.

Now that you know the warning system, you should examine your home for the safest place of shelter. Fire and Rescue personnel are trained to search in three types of collapses - a lean-to collapse, a vee collapse, and a pancake collapse. In all three cases, safe spaces called voids, are created near outside bearing walls. In the case of a tornado, the most likely place for a void is in the northeast corner of the basement.

BE PREPARED FOR SEVERE WEATHER

Emergency supplies should be prepared in case of a tornado and stored in or near your shelter. These should include; a portable radio, flash light, water, dry or canned food for several days, tools, fire extinguisher (ABC type), blankets, pail or bucket, can opener, eating utensils, and a well stocked first aid kit. Remember to rotate your food items every few months and hold regular family drills.

If a tornado strikes and you cannot reach shelter, stay away from outside doors, corridors and walls facing the wind, heavy appliances, and windows. Crouch under a table or an inside doorway and cover your head. Never take shelter under a mobile home or camper, or in a car.


After the storm has passed, check your home for gas leaks and structural damage, watching out for falling debris and broke glass. If you smell gas, leave the house immediately and call from a neighbor's house. Don't use electricity if you suspect damage or wet wiring and stay away from downed power lines. Learn how to shut off your utilities safely. Remain calm if you are trapped. Search & Rescue personnel will find you, though it may take some time. Don't move someone who is seriously injured. Apply basic first aid and seek trained medical help. Listen to the radio for further information.

In the event you are forced to evacuate your home, post a message where you are going, such as a relative's home or emergency shelter. Take with you prescription drugs, a change of clothing, radio and flashlight, a list of valuables, food and water, money, and a sleeping bag or blankets. Leave pets at home with food and water.

SPRING CLEANUP TIME



Spring cleanup will again be scheduled the first two weeks in June. As in the past, we will pick up items placed at the curb. There will be no alley pickups. Brush and limbs will not be picked up unless they are cut into 3-4 foot lengths and tied in bundles of reasonable size. Building materials such as bricks, concrete or blocks will not be accepted.

There's no better time than the present to begin getting your home, garage and yard in shape. Refer to the map above for the date the truck will be in your area. If for some reason we fall behind schedule, we will continue the next day.

Since we seem to accumulate more trash nd yard debris during the summer months, the General Inspectors have some reminders for us.

Always place household garbage in tightly sealed trash containers.

Grass, leaves, paper and other debris should be placed in trash bags.

Limbs and branches will be picked up by the sanitation people if they are cut in 3-4 foot lengths and bundled.

Lawns must be moved and maintained throughout the growing season.

The General Inspectors would like to call your attention to another yard violation occurring in various areas within the City. Parking vehicles in a required front yard or in a public right-of-way easement is a violation of City Code and can detract from the general appearance of the neighborhood.

It will also be beneficial to remember that these "tips" are being enforced for the benefit of the community as a whole. They not only improve the appearance of your home but your neighborhood and community will profit from your effort. Let's work together in developing a real sense of pride in Wood River.



D. A. R. E. DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION

The Wood River Police Department recently donated a 4' x 6' D.A.R.E. flag to Lewis & Clark Elementary School in Wood River to symbolize that the school is participating in the D.A.R.E. Program.

D.A.R.E. is a joint project to prevent drug abuse, of the Illinois State Police, State Board of Education, the Dept. of Alcohol and Substance Abuse, your School District, and the Wood River Police Dept. The 17-week program is aimed at students in the 5th grade. A uniformed police officer teaches the students about such subjects as self-esteem, interpersonal communication skills, decision-making, and positive alternatives to drug abuse behavior.

Aside from instruction, the D.A.R.E. Officer is available to present short talks on basic safety and drug issues in grades kindergarten through fourth. This officer meets with teachers and interacts with students during lunch and recess. He is also available to speak with community groups about the D.A.R.E. Program and drug abuse.

If you would like to participate with this group or contribute to the Wood River D.A.R.E. Program, all donations should be sent to the Police Dept. plainly mark "D.A.R.E.". Any and all assistance will greatly appreciated.

The Police Department has also purchased a D.A.R.E. flag for display at City Hall. It can be seen flying daily in recognition of the City's participation in the D.A.R.E. project.



Sandy has lined up professionals for hanging wall paper, designing custom draperies and furniture upholstering.



I would like to take this opportunity to inform you of the programs and discounts available to our senior citizens.

The Golf Course offers several specials to resident senior citizens; a season pass can be purchased for \$110, a 20-play card for \$75, or seniors may play on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays for \$2.00 for 9 holes. Also, watch for special rates on golf cars on certain days.

The Aquatic Center offers a season swim pass to resident seniors for only \$25. (Many seniors enjoy the "adult swim" everyday from 11:00 AM - 1:00 PM. Some swim and some walk in the water for exercise, while others sit and visit with friends. It's a great time to enjoy the Aquatic Center before it is opened to the general public at 1:00 PM.)

The fitness trail located on the East Alton-Wood River High School athletic field may also be used by our senior Each location has an explanation of appropriate exercise.

Another program for Seniors is the penalty waiver on your water bill. To sign up, bring verification of age to the Water Office. If you are unable to pay your water bill before the penalty date, you will not be charged a late penalty.

The Round House is currently used on the second Thursday of each month by the Senior Citizen Club for a luncheon meeting. The Wood River Women's Club Economic Development Committee is looking for a location to create a senior citizen day center. As Chairman of this committee, I'll keep you posted.
