




## Your Library Has "CLASS"

Wood River Public Library has stepped out of the dark ages and into the age of automation! Through participation in CLASS (Cooperative Libraries for Automated System Services), the Library has improved its level of service. The Library has joined with the Lewis & Clark Library System and ten other area libraries to form an automation network that will allow for faster, efficient service and direct access to the holdings of other libraries. The automated network facilitates sharing of resources to meet your needs as quickly as possible. On June 1, the library began keeping track of library transactions by computer and will soon add an automated catalog for direct access by its patrons.

New barcoded resident cards are now being issued. The Library encourages residents to bring in their "old style" library card to be updated. Any Wood River resident not currently holding a library card should come in and apply now. The Library offers much more than books these days - magazines, videos, audio cassettes, records, cameras, and smoke detectors are among the items waiting to be picked up at 326 E. Ferguson. A plain paper microfilm/fiche reader/printer makes viewing and copying old newspapers or census records a breeze.

State-of-the-art high technology is being used to speed patron reference services with the InfoTrac computer system which allows patrons to search several years of issues of more than 200 magazines for articles written on a specific topic. The computer tells you which magazines the library currently subscribes to, and listings for relevant articles displayed on the computer screen can be printed out for future reference. The system is always up to date since a new database with indexing is delivered monthly. Wood River Public Library is on the move! Check it out!



## National Children's Book Week November 12-18, 1990

The Library will also sponsor, in conjunction with Lewis & Clark Library System and Waldenbooks, a "Design a Bookmark" contest. First, second and third place prizes of \$15, \$10, and \$5 gift certificates to Waldenbooks will be awarded in each category. 
The City is saddened by the loss of a long-time community leader, Warren Stookey.

## **Falling Leaves**

Leaf rakers in Wood River will have a choice of disposal methods this Fall, including City pick-ups, composting and burning. Although landfills can no longer accept yard wastes, several options for leaf disposal are available:

- BURN YOUR LEAVES Burning is permissible on your own property from mid-September to mid-May, during daylight hours only. Leaf burning must be done under supervision, with a garden hose close at hand. Burning in streets and alleys is prohibited.
- RAKE LEAVES TO CURB Leaves will be picked up by
  the City during the "leaf pickup schedule". Check the
  schedule below, and place your leaves at curbside on the
  scheduled day. The city will make every effort to follow this
  schedule, although weather conditions and heavy amounts of
  leaves may cause delays. Your patience in these circumstances
  is appreciated.
- MULCH YOUR LEAVES Many residents are mulching their leaves by mowing over them for composting. Pamphlets on methods of composting are available at City Hall.

## City of Wood River Schedule for Leaf Pick Up Starting Monday, November 5 - 30

(Leaf Machine and Street Sweeper)

MONDAYS	The area West of Wood River Avenue including
TUESDAYS	West of the railroad tracks.  The area between Wood River Avenue and Third Street including all of Wood River
WEDNESDAYS	Avenue. The area between Third Street and Sixth Street including all of Third Street, Eastwood Sub-
THURSDAYS	division and Lincoln Addition.  The area between Sixth Street and Ninth Street including all of Sixth Street, Fox Acres, Metzger
FRIDAYS	Street and Berry Road. The entire area East of Ninth Street (including all of Ninth Street)

The leaves should be raked to the curb or street edge early in the morning scheduled for pick-up, and not be allowed to remain in the gutter line in case of rain as the leaves will plug the catch basins and cause flooding during a rain. It is further requested that grass not be dumped along the curb with the leaves as the leaf machine will not pick up grass.




Since our Spring clean-up has been so widely used by residents, we are again offering a Fall clean-up.

A schedule is listed below of the day the truck will be in your area. It is necessary to place your items for pickup IN THE FRONT near curb. There will be no catch up days this Fall so be sure to get your items out before your pickup day.

Also, please remember, brush must be cut and tied in approximate 3' bundles and we cannot accept building materials such as bricks, rocks, blocks, or tires.

### Prepare Your Home Survival Kit

An earthquake couldn't happen here. Or could it?

Recent news articles have discussed the possibility of an earthquake in our local area, which borders on the New Madrid Fault. One seismic expert has even predicted that a quake will occur on December 3 of this year.

Tornadoes, floods and droughts are not unusual in the Midwest, but these are fairly localized disasters, and can be dealt with through community mutual aid agreements.

The after-effects of an earthquake are so far-reaching that each community's emergency service people may be on their own for several days before outside assistance can arrive.

The New Madrid Fault may lie silent for another 100 years, or a seismic threat may be imminent. Either way, it's always beneficial to be prepared. And the best way citizens can help themselves during the critical 72 hours following such a disaster is with a do-it-yourself home survival kit.

Base your kit preparation on the concept of a three-day camping trip, where there may be no food, water, utilities or sanitation.

Your supplies should include:

- A first aid kit, store-bought or homemade, containing a first aid manual, antiseptic, bandages, prescription drugs when needed, a pair of scissors, tweezers and related items.
- Sanitation supplies, including several gallons of bottled water per person, soap, toilet paper, garbage bags, disinfectant, shaving gear, toothpaste, disposable diapers and other hygienic goods.
- 3. Tools and safety supplies, such as a battery-operated portable radio, a clock, dry clothing stored in plastic bags, blankets or sleeping bags for each family member, gloves, serviceable shoes, a flashlight with spare batteries, candles, matches, a shovel and some basic shop tools, including a screw diver, crescent wrench, pliers and electrical tape.
- Food supplies should include canned goods, a manual can opener, an outdoor grill or camper stove, paper plates and towels, plastic utensils, plastic cups, pots and pans.

These emergency supplies should be stored in containers and kept in a cool, dry place near the entrance to your house. Five gallon plastic buckets with lids make sturdy, waterproof containers for supplies.

A home survival kit can be a lifesaver in the aftermath of a tornado, flood or severe winter storm. By subdividing the kit, it can serve as a winter survival pack when stored in the trunk of your car.

Further information on emergency preparedness is available at the Fire Department and City Hall.

#### 1. POLICE AUCTION



## **New Businesses In Town**


