In March, an essay contest was sponsored by the Committee giving children from the 4th grade on up to high school, the opportunity to express what they like best about Wood River and win cash press well.

Looking Backward, Looking Forward

Looking back, many important projects were accomplished in 1983, and a variety of problems were solved. Looking forward, 1984 promises to be just as productive for the City of Wood River and its citizens.

Key Events in 1983

- 1. Reduced the <u>tax levy</u> for the first time ever.
- 2. Reduced annual City expenses by \$105,000, and reduced one time only expenses by \$123,000.
- Constructed sanitary sewers for the 150 homes in Glendale Gardens and Ivy Heights areas of Wood River.
- 4. Reached agreement with the State Department of Transportation for the Wood River Avenue/Edwardsville Road intersection improvement project.
- 5. Purchased a new fire pumper truck, a fire rescue tool, and a catch basin/sewer line cleaning machine to reduce sewer backups and flooding.

Published by the City of Wood River to inform its residents and to promote better understanding between the city government and the people it serves.

- 6. Assumed daily management of the Township senior citizens mini-bus (SCOOT) in order to prevent its termination - and received a new minibus with a wheelchair lift,
- 7. Completed construction of the East Storm Water Channel east of 9th Street in order to reduce storm water flooding.
- 8. Begin construction of Phase 1 of the wastewater treatment plant at a cost of \$1,150,000.
- 9. The 43 member Blue Ribbon Citizens Swim Pool Advisory Committee recommended a replacement Aquatic Center at Central Park following months of study and tours of other swimming facilities in Illinois and Missouri.

Key Plans for 1984

- Received \$200,000 grant from the Illinois Department of Conservation for the Central Park Aquatic Center.
- Begin construction of the replacement Aquatic Center, and hope to open the water slide in June 1984.
- 3. Complete Phase 1 and begin construction of Phase 2 of regional wastewater treatment plant.
- 4. Work closely with the Wood River 75th Diamond Jubilee anniversary celebration committee.
- Complete construction of a new intersection at Wood River Avenue and Edwardsville Road.
- Adopt a new tax levy ordinance with a continued reduction in total property taxes to be collected.
- 7. Begin a comprehensive 2 year training and certification program for members of the Wood River Fire Department.
- 8 Begin construction of a replacement/central fire station.

Did you know that:

*Reported crimes in Wood River have dropped 10%!

*The number of crimes solved in Wood River has increased 116%! *The number of traffic accidents in Wood River has dropped 45%!

All of this has been accomplished while the Department has experienced a 68% decrease in overtime and a 10% reduction in the number of police officers. How did they do it? Read

For four years, the Department has tried to improve the service provided to residents through directed efforts, One of the directed efforts is in the area of serious crimes and the success rate of solving these serious crimes.

Here are the results of a 5-year study comparing the results of Police Department efforts.

The Wood River Police Department has shown a steady increase in the number of the number of crimes solved, while crimes reported has gone down. 1979, Wood River's rate of solving serious crimes, 35% in 1982, is much higher than the average rate in Illinois for solving serious crimes, 19%. The 1983 rate of 41% for solving serious crimes in Wood River will again be much higher than the Illinois average rate.

Crimes can also be described as "crimes against persons" and "crimes against property". Below is the breakdown of Wood River's reported crim

Crimes against property are the most frequent, including burglary. River Police solve burglaries 33% of the time which is again much higher than the State average of 12%.

Another directed effort has been in the area of traffic accident reductions. A selective traffic enforcement program was funded by the Illinois Department of Transportation until mid-1982 to reduce traffic accidents in Wood River. are the results of this program:

Keep Your Dog Safe and Identifiable

Vaccination Clinic Offered

Before dog licenses are issued, dogs must have been inoculated against rabies within the past year. Bring your dog to the inoculation clinic at the City Garage on April 28, from 2:00 - 3:00 PM. Dr. Robert Brakeville, from Alton, will be inoculating dogs against rabies for a fee of \$7.00.

Out On A Limb?

There are 4 ways you can dispose of your brush and limbs:

- 1) Haul your own brush and limbs (ONLY) to a site north of the City's water treatment plant, for burning by the City. Look for the sign posted which marks the dump site.
- 2) Cut brush and limbs into $2^{\frac{1}{2}} 3$ feet lengths, tie in bundles, not larger than 10-12 inches in diameter. These bundles can be placed out with regular refuse for pick-up.
- Hire a tree-trimming firm to trim and dispose of brush and limbs.
- 4) Place brush and limbs out in front of your property and call the City's street crew for pick-up. This will cost the requesting resident \$20 per truckload (with a one truckload minimum charge). The resident must sign a commitment sheet and will be billed by the City upon completion of the job. Call 254-5822 to request City pick-up.



Show Your Dog You Care

May 1st is the deadline for licensing and inoculation of dogs over six months old, as required by law.

Apply for your dog license prior to May 1st at the Finance Office in City Hall. Dog owners have a grace period of 30 days, for which there will be no penalty. However, after May 31st, you will be required to pay an additional 50% fee for each license.

License fees are as follows:

May 1st - May 31st:

- A. \$3.50 for each male or spayed female dog
- B. \$5.50 for each unspayed female dog.

After May 31st:

- A. \$5.25 for each male or spayed female dog.
- B. \$8.25 for each unspayed female dog.

After you pay the fees and complete a license application, you will receive a metal personalized dog tag for your dog. This tag should be attached to your dog's collar and worn at all times.

If the metal tag is lost, a dupli cate tag can be issued upon the payment of \$3.00. Also, if there is a change in ownership of a dog, the new owner can have the license transferred to his/her name upon the payment of \$3.00.

See City Before Signing

People in Wood River are protected by many City ordinances, such as the sign ordinance. For your own convenience, please check on sign regulations before purchasing or posting any type of sign — this especially applies to business owners.

The types of signs that are strictly prohibited in our City include:

- 1) Mobile/portable marquees (may be used for 30 days only)
- 2) Pennants, streamers, etc.
- Signs attached to trees, fences, or public utility poles.
- 4) Defunct signs.
- 5) Roof-mounted signs.

June A permanent <u>display</u> of historical items and memorabilia will open at the Wood River Library.


Certain areas in Wood River will be designated as <u>Historical Sights</u>. They will be marked with a sign and a map and brochure will be available to guide you to the historical sights.

Do You Know Where

ır Water Main Valve Is?

Every now and then, problems will ise with your home water system. Ideas will leak, pipes will burst and ter heaters may even blow out. In se of an emergency or while doing pairs, you will need to know how to myour water off.

All homes, apartments and businesses buld have a main water supply valve at cuts off water to the entire ilding. Do you know where your main live is? Does everyone else in the mily know where it is? When there is emergency, you'll need to know in a rry to prevent water damage to your me.

The most likely locations of a water in valve are: 1) where the water pply pipe enters your home (in the sement). 2) near your washing machine ok-up, or 3) near your hot water ater. Most sinks, wash basins and ilets in the house have shutoff valves low them that cut off water to that rticular fixture. The hot water ater should also have a shutoff valve at cuts off hot water to the whole use.

Take time now to identify all the sutoff valves and see if they work. st of all check for the main shutoff clve that turns off water to the entire ouse.

Turn the valve off and check if all me water faucets in the building are nut off. If you cannot get your water nut off, a plumber may be needed to epair, replace or install a main valve.

Once you have found the right valve, irk it with a tag or bright colorful int to make it easy for everyone in the family to find. If you ever have a ster problem, you'll know where to shut the water off to prevent wasted water to water damage to your home.

SENIOR SERVICES





Our Senior Citizens mini-bus is now named "S.C.O.O.T." — Senior Citizens of Our Township. "Scoot" is a free service provided for any senior citizen or handicapped person in Wood River Township. You can make a reservation one day in advance to go grocery shopping, to the doctor or dentist, to run important errands, or to be delivered or taken home from the hospital or nursing home.

"Scoot" has been operated by the Wood River Police Department since April 1, 1983 for all of Wood River Township. Most expenses are paid for by the Madison County Transit District, with the dispatcher provided by the Township. "Scoot" and its friendly drivers provide more than 600 one way rides each month.
