High rise, low rise, taxpayer, target hazard, special hazard, multiple exposures, conflagration threat these terms sound foreign to the average citizen. To a fire service professional, however, their meaning is all too clear. Each term represents a building or business that exhibits the possibility for a large loss of life or property and thus is a priority.


Wood River's newest heavy duty tool to protect these and other types of buildings is due to arrive the first week in June. Snorkel 1., as she's already been named by the department, is the 85 foot, articulating boom, Aerial Device as pictured. At this point, she's not very attractive. The picture was taken at the Pierce Manufacturing plant during the engineering inspection, and a considerable amount of work and testing is required for the finished product.

Obviously, the department is anxious to bring her home. But, as Snorkel 1. is already a product of five years work, a few more weeks doesn't seem that long. Yes, I did say five years. Since 1987 the department has worked toward an apparatus that would maximize our

firefighting capabilities for those large commercial type buildings we have now and those that may be built in the future. In 1989 six firefighters and the Chief set about the task of finding the right type of Aerial device for Wood River. After hundreds of manhours in meetings and volumes of research, Lt. Steve Alexander then spent the next six months writing detailed specifications for that piece of equipment. In October of 1990 the Council gave permission for bids to be sent out and in January negotiations began with the low bidder. The actual designing and building of the truck took an additional ten months. (Five years three months from beginning to end.)

Certainly, no one fire apparatus is built to handle every situation and neither will Snorkel 1. There are as many different designs as there are cities. The committee, however, will tell you that she was designed to meet a majority of the needs for Wood River today and to assure that future growth is not impeded.



South of Lewis, East of Sixth Street (including Rockwood Village).


Thursday - June 4 Area 4

#### New Hours for Recycling Center and Dumpsters

Due to budget restrictions, the recycling drop-off center, the dumpsters for bulky items, and the brush dump will operate on a reduced schedule, beginning June 1. Also, a new entrance is being planned to aid in a smoother and safer operation. When construction is complete, signs will indicate traffic flow.

Effective June 1, the new hours are:

Dates Open: Monday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Saturday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Sunday noon to 4 p.m.

Closed: Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday

The Recycling Center and Dumpster is for Wood River residents only. The recycling center accepts: aluminum, glass bottles and jars, plastic milk jugs only, and tin cans.

There is no charge to dump grass and leaves, but dumping brush will cost \$5 a load. The charge to dump junk items remains the same:

\$5 - for a single item

\$10 - loaded to the top of pickup truck bed

\$20 - loaded to the top of pickup cab

\$35 - loaded over the top of pickup cab

Wood chips are available for \$5 per pickup truck load or \$1 for bushel basket or equivalent.

Remember, eurb side pick-up is available for a \$15.00 fee.







# **Utility Rate Increases for Coming Fiscal Year**

Water and sewer rates will make a modest 4% increase for the coming fiscal year. Escalating prices in all of the supplies that the City purchases, a 9% electrical rate increase, and employee contracted salary scales have necessitated this increase. The Wood River Water Fund has traditionally been a money maker, but a loss of \$100,000 was projected for this fiscal year. After considering all of the options, it was decided that a small increase of 4% this year, even if a similar increase is needed next year, would be much easier to absorb than a 15% to 20% raise if the adjustment

was delayed. With this rate increase virtually all system betterments will be continued including our ten year meter replacement program, replacing old fire hydrants and valves, updating our maps, and updating maintenance on the water treatment plant. Virtually no funds have been provided for main extensions or for long-range capital improvements. However, Wood River city water continues to be the envy of most communities in our area. City crews look out for our finished water from first drawing it from underground wells,

through the treatment plant and distribution system until it gets to your home. Wood River can rightfully be proud of the quality water system.

Our combined storm and sanitary sewer system has cost us extra, partly because further Federal regulations on discharge must be met. Mandates from EPA will require additional construction on our sewer outlet which in turn will add to cost starting next year. Every effort will be made to hold down costs, and no one wants to see rates go higher.

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
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
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## Hall of Fame

In this issue, we salute a REAL "Hall of Famer", Fire Lieutenant Mark Burris. 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## Remodeled Businesses





Stop by to see the newly remodeled DAIRY QUEEN at 1288 Edwardsville Road. They have a new modern look for '92.



Congratulations to the United Church of Christ at 6th & Penning for the improvements to their church. They have a beautiful new front and have installed an elevator for their elderly and disabled members.







# Message From the City Manager

1992-93 City Budget

Preparing a budget isn't easy this year. whether it's for your individual family, for Congress in Washington, our Legislators in Springfield, or even the City of Wood River. The unfortunate part for cities is that not only has the help and assistance from Washington and Springfield been cut back, but also new mandates for spending have increased. Cities are at the bottom end of the pyramid. It is our cities that are sending the money to our State and Federal Governments, and yet the cities are the losers when it comes to funding for programs that are mandated from up above. Just in this past year, Wood River has been mandated, along with everyone else, to make changes for the handicapped, to make costly changes in our sewage treatment, to provide additional testing on our water, to follow minimum wage guidelines, and to restrict the refuse going

Who can be against any of these? We are all in favor of these; we all want to have a better life and better environment. but these things cost money. At the same time that these mandates are placed on the city, funds that local people send to Washington and Springfield are being diverted to take care of their budget crises caused by their previous fiscal irresponsibility. With few notable exceptions, the hundreds of local governments in Illinois have been fiscally responsible. They have to; there is no other way for them to run their business than to have a balanced budget every year. Now, the crunch is finally catching up with the

other levels of government and they are taking it out on local governments — the only solvent area in the governmental chain. And just because cities aren't embroiled in red ink, the Federal and State Governments feel that cities should carry a bigger share.

We've been carrying our share all along and in a fiscally responsible manner. The money that gets spent in Wood River and other local governments is watched too closely by the citizens to have frivolous expenditures or boondoggle projects that eat up so much of the Federal and State money. Citizens run into their Council members every day. They see City employees on the streets and in the stores. Any time you want to register a complaint you are not reluctant to let us know what we need to do to get things straightened out.

Fortunately or unfortunately, that message is finally being heard on the State and Federal levels. It's just too bad that your local governments have had to take the brunt of this effort.

In particular, cities need the income tax surcharge that was earmarked for them four years ago. Wood River needs to have the T.I.F. sales tax that was established by State Statute and committed to the city for the term of our project. Senator Vadalabene and Representative McPike have supported us on these efforts. We can only hope that the rest of the Legislature will stick with us on these measures. And we need to keep our guard up to see that no more mandates are imposed on the city without funds being provided to pay for them.

## **Notes From Your City Inspectors**

- 1. KEEP IT SHORT! Just a reminder, Spring is here grass and weeds must be kept under 8" to comply with City ordinance. Let's help each other. If the City has to send you a letter and has to cut your grass, it ends up costing you a lot more than having it done yourself.
- 2. DON'T BAG IT! If you put your trash out in plastic bags, the dogs and birds will love you. You will also be in violation of City ordinance which requires that trash be placed in tightly
- covered containers. We receive many complaints about trash in alleys, so **please** help keep the alleys clean.
- 3. BUILDING PERMITS! Play it safe and always check with the Building & Zoning Department before starting any type of remodeling or new construction work. In addition to major construction, permits are required for roofs, fences, carports, remodeling, swimming pools, storage sheds, electrical service, etc.

# Council Corner

#### What's New in '92

The first quarter of 1992 is behind us. April 15 has come and gone. Governor Edgar has issued his "State of the State" and budget proposal for fiscal 1992-93 (stating Illinois is in financial trouble). President Bush says that the recession is turning upward and recovery is just around the corner.

What can you expect in Wood River during fiscal 1992-93? The City Council has adopted a budget of \$10.9 million. Thanks to the hard work of Finance Director Joey Tolbert, City Manager Barrett Jones, all of the department heads and support staff, Wood River will continue to operate in the black. Citizens will not experience cuts in services, however, some adjustments may be made to make operations more productive and feasible.

A modest 4% increase in water and sewer rates allows the operations of these funds to continue as an effective cost center. It was decided that a few small increases over a period of years is better than a major increase in one year.

Public safety personnel will have some new equipment, including new mobile and portable radios for the police department (replacing equipment that in some cases is at least 10 years old), a new fire truck and communications system.

The Parks and Recreation staff is gearing up for another summer of softball and baseball leagues, swimming and evening band concerts at Central Park. Belk Park Golf Course once again, ranks in the top three of public courses in the Greater St. Louis area, with construction of a new clubhouse scheduled in late Fall.

Street work and repairs by both local and state crews will continue throughout the summer, including Rock Hill Road and Sixth Street.

On behalf of the City Council, I would like to encourage you to look around the town, take pride in what Wood River has to offer both now and in the future.
