# New Plant Saves City \$170,000

Phase I of the two-phase Wastewater Treatment project has gotten underway with a ground-breaking ceremony on Saturday, April 2. The project, which has been in the works for 10 years, involves the cooperation of the surrounding communities and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

The Wastewater Treatment Project will help to produce cleaner water to protect the environment and especially the Mississippi River - and, at the same time, reduce costs, thus saving you money.

The Wastewater Treatment project will save \$700,000 over previous plans; \$170,000 of this savings will go to Wood River. Also, future user fees will be 20% lower. Eighty-five percent of the cost will be paid by other sources; the City will pay only 15%.

Phase I will cost \$1,139,400. Seventy-Five percent of the cost will be paid by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, through a grant that the City received. The remaining 25% will be the shared responsibility of the contributing communities, including

# Cost Cutter: Saving Dollars On Police Cars

The Wood River Police Department is switching to a "one officer, one car" policy. Each officer will have twentyfour hour responsibility for each car.

The plan was adopted by City Council after a successful one-year pilot project using four cars. The results of the project, which are similar to results obtained in other cities, show that the one-officer-one-car system is cheaper and more effective than the system which keeps cars going 24-hours-a-day with several different drivers everyday. Here's why"

Costs

1) Car care is greatly improved. Officers are responsible for the condition of their car. The assignment of a car is a privilege, not a right. Cars are driven more carefully, watched more closely - one driver really gets to know the car well. So, cars last longer.

2) Maintenance by officers is on off-duty time. Officers make arrangements for maintenance when they feel it's necessary. On-the-job time and officer availability is improved.

3) Cars are purchased from the State Police for about \$1,600. The City spends \$700-900 to paint the cars and get them in good mechanical condition. The cars are then good for about 2 years of individual assignment.

Effectiveness

1) Pride and morale are improved, Officers get their own car and they get to know it well. Off-duty, they can drive anywhere within the City limits, as long as they have their badge and gun, and no one else in the car. This leads to:

2) Higher visibility. Off-duty officers drive and park within the community and there are more cars. Even off-duty, there is no easier, more effective message than a police car parked in your neighborhood.

3) Greater service. When off-duty, officers are still called upon to make stops if they see violations, and they are available for assists.

The entire fleet should be changed over to the new system by July. So we you should feel good about greater police car visability - and saving about \$6,000 per year.

Wood River, South Roxana, Hartford, and the Kendall Hills area of Wood River Township. Phase I will be completed by April, 1984.

Phase I involves the modernization and improvement of the City's primary treatment facility at the South Main Street site.

Phase II involves a secondary treatment plant which will tie in with the Amoco Plant which is conveniently right next door to the City's primary plant on South Main.

Phase II bids will be taken some time this Summer, with construction to begin in the Fall. The project should take one year. The City of Wood River will begin operating the new combined wastewater treatment facility by about January, 1985.

One very notable fact is that Amoco donated their treatment facility to the City in July, 1982. The Amoco Plant was only 6 years old and was worth \$6,000,000 at the time. And, after giving the plant to the City, Amoco agreed to pay the City for the final treatment of water which it would have already treated.

# Swimming Pool Will Open June 11

"Come swim with us in 1983" could be the last year we'll see. This theme has been selected to promote the Wood River Municipal Swimming Pool which will open Saturday, June 11, 1983, for the last time. Our oval shape 2 million gallon concrete tank has attracted over an estimated four million swimmers in its 54 years of operation.

Season passes go on sale at the Roundhouse Recreation Center from June 6 through June 10, from 1:00 to 5:00 PM, and at the pool beginning June 11. Prices of season passes are: children-resident \$17, non-resident \$21; adult-resident \$27, non-resident \$35. Daily admissions are \$1.25 for children and \$2.50 for adults. A Learn-to-Swim Program will cost residents \$7.50 and non-residents \$10. Learn-to-Swim sessions are scheduled for June 13 through June 24, July 5 through July 18, and July 25 through August 5.



The driver will supply 3 x 5 cards on which riders should write the date, their name, and their suggested name for the service. The winner will receive a \$50 food certificate from Schnucks.


# City Streets To Be Resurfaced

This Summer the City of Wood River will resurface the following streets and alleys with Meramec gravel: Acton Avenue between 9th Street and Edwardsville Road; Penning Avenue between 4th Street and 9th Street; Jennings Avenue between Eliot Avenue and 5th Street; Carringer Avenue between Whitelaw Avenue and 2nd Street; Park Lane between Willow Street and 6th Street; George Street between Edwardsville Road and Summit Street; Woodland Avenue between George Street and 6th Street; alleys south of Penning Avenue between 6th Street and Haller.

## Do I Need A Permit???

During the summer months, many of us are planning to do repairs and/or construction, both inside and outside of our homes. It is important for you, as a homeowner, to remember that new additions or alternations generally require a permit from the City. Also, garage and yard sales, fence construction, etc. require permits. Permits are required to protect you - and your neighbor!

# The "Skeeters" Are Coming

Summer is almost here, and the time is coming when mosquitos will be around to bug you. There are two ways to control mosquitos:

- 1) Get'em before they grow; or
- 2) Get'em when they're already grown up.

Mosquitos lay their eggs in standing water. Without water, their eggs can't hatch. So, one way to help control mosquitos is to get rid of standing water. Old cans, pans, bottles, vases, bird baths, buckets, old tires, drums, wading and swimming pools, leaky pipes, faucets and hoses — all can provide the water that mosquito eggs need. So get rid of empty containers or change the water in the containers and repair the leaks.

A second thing you can do is follow a regular spraying program. This means not only spraying when you see or hear a mosquito, but also spraying mosquito roosting areas such as shrubs, bushes, weeds. eaves, porches, and garages on a regular basis with an approved insecticide.

Do a little preparation now, start a mosquito control program of your own, and this summer you won't be bugged by "skeeters."

## Notes From Your City Inspector

It's about time for the Spring Clean-Up, so get your garages, attics and basements cleaned out. A truck will be in your area between June 6 and June 16 (exact date for your area is indicated on the map below) to pick up your trash, junk, household items,

Tree limbs will be picked up only if they are cut in approximately 3' lengths and tied in bundles. Swing sets, gliders, etc., will be picked up if they are dismantled. Rocks, bricks, concrete blocks and the like will not be picked up.

Place items that are to be disposed near the location of your usual refuse pickup area.

Now, just a reminder about your weeds. They grow fast at this time of year, so keep an eye on them and keep them cut. Remember, over 8 inches tall is too tall! - and we don't want to cut them for you.


## Pride Of Wood River

# A "Growing" Picnic Shelter

The Building Trades class at East ton-Wood River High School has doubled the size of the Rotary Club Picnic Shelter at Belk Park. The shelter, one of three at the park, including the Optimist & Lions' Shelters, was originally 16' x 16'. Now, it's 16' x 32'.

The project got started when the Building Trades Instructor at the High School realized that the class would finish early on a house they were building. (The class builds a house every two years.) He contacted the Belk Park Golf Course Manager about the idea of the class doing work on a building project for the City.

By working on such projects, students learn skills which can get them jobs when they graduate.

With the help of donated concrete for the pad by the Kienstra Corporation, the project began April 11. Usually 5-7 students of the 13 student class worked on the project, while the others worked on finishing touches to the house.


Here are some basic rules concerning permits for building construction, and garage and yard sales:

#### BUILDING PERMITS

- Never assume anything! Before beginning a home improvement project, call City Hall and ask about required permits and fees for any repairs or work on buildings, plumbing, electrical, demolition, patios and swim pools.
- All permits must be posted at the site where work is being performed.
   The construction of fences requires permits. Maximum heights of fences vary depending on: a) whether the property is in a residential or commercial district, and b) if the property is a corner lot.

#### GARAGE & YARD SALES

- 1. Permits are acquired from the City Clerk and must be visible during sales.
- Garage and yard sales can be conducted no more than two (2) times a year, on a specific property.
- 3. A garage or yard sale cannot last for more than 3 days (72 hours)

Remember, when building additions or making repairs or alternation—DO NOT ASSUME ANYTHING! Call City Hall at 254-0123 for more information regarding required permits; taking this precaution can save you time and moneyresulting in a well-done job.

# New Lime-Slaker Will Sav \$12,000 Yearly

A lime-slaker is a machine which puts lime into water during the softening process. The City's 20 year-old lime-slaker has been replaced with a new one, which is more efficient, thus saving you money.

Layout and installation of the new machine was done by the Public Works
Department with the aid of electrical and sheet metal contractors.

The new lime-slaker was installed in April. After only one full month (May) of operation, the machine is running 100% more efficient than the old machine. In other words, it:

- 1) uses half as much lime, so it
- 2) saves the City (you!) \$1,000 per month, so it
- 3) will pay for itself in 3 years

# 1000 Fingers Printed

Last month, the Police Benevolent Society and the Wood River Police Department sponsored a student fingerprinting program at area schools.

The program was first proposed by the Lions' Club as a way to foster police - community relations' and to provide a permanent record for identification.

Over 1,000 students were fingerprinted during May - between 60%-70% of all students.
